Galway's Heritage Buildings Show 2016

The Venue

This exciting exhibition takes place in the grounds of Portumna Castle which is managed by the Office of Public Works. Dramatically located on the shores of Lough Derg on the River Shannon, Portumna Castle is an imposing example of Irish architecture of the early 17th-century.

Built before 1618 by Richard Burke, 4th Earl of Clanricarde, the house became the main seat of the Burke family for over 200 years. The semi-fortified house was one of the first in Ireland to display a renaissance influence and it also represents a transition between the fortified castle and the typical larger house of the eighteenth century.

Today, Portumna Castle is a centre of conservation skills and training where the OPW operate one of their traditional skills apprenticeship programmes.

The Galway Heritage Building Show 2016 takes place in marquees located in the Outer Courtyard of Portumna Castle, while the hourly conservation talks take place in the audio-visual room of Portumna Castle.

Parking: There is no on-site parking for visitors to the exhibition at Portumna Castle. Parking is available at the Portumna Marina (five minutes' walk from the Castle) or on street parking in the village of Portumna (five minutes' walk from Portumna Castle).

Food: The OPW Portumna Castle site does not have a café however Portumna village is a five minute walk from the castle where there are a selection of cafes and restaurants.

A weekend of traditional building skills demonstrations and conservation talks will take place at the OPW's Portumna Castle. Portumna Castle will become a one-stop destination for owners in need of accurate, impartial and free advice on caring and repairing their old buildings.

Take the opportunity to:

- ♦ Watch over two dozen craftspeople demonstrate key traditional building skills needed for the conservation of old buildings including: sash window repairs; stained glass & fanlight conservation; stone carving; dry stonewall construction; use of lime based mortars; decorative plasterwork; ironwork; slate roofing; mud wall construction; thatching; and furniture and clock restoration to name a few.
- ♦ Listen to informative and interactive talks on old buildings: their history, maintenance and repair.
- ♦ Engage one-to-one with your Council's Conservation Officer to ask about the management and care of your old building.
- ♦ Gather information on protected structure planning law, insurance, finance and related topics.
- ♦ Talk to representatives at the information stands: Association of Architectural Conservation Officers, Building Limes Forum; Galway County Council; Galway Heritage Forum; Heritage Contractors; Irish Georgian Society; and Irish Horological Craft Forum.
