Milltown river project hits a new phase

UNSEASONAL low water levels have created ideal conditions for the completion of river enhancement works along Milltown's popular and Claregalway. Clare River Walk project.

Work had to be abandoned last year because of record high water levels but those involved are confident that this year's deadline of September will be met, allowing Milltown to add another achievement to the long list compiled by the community in recent years. Extensive instream fishery facilities are now being put in place.

The river walk project has proved a great attraction for walkers, anglers, nature lovers and schoolchildren studying their environment. It is now completed from Milltown village up as far as Russellstown Bridge where it joins a looped walk, bringing the walker back to the starting point through countryside along minor roads.

Community activists are delighted that funding has been secured to continue river enhancement works further up the Clare River between Russellstown Bridge

towards Dalgan Bridge.

The Clare River begins at the confluence of the Dalgan and Sinker rivers near Dalgan Bridge and runs for 55 miles to Lough Corrib via Corofin

the plan was drawn up by a scientific team in 2010 but severe weather conditions hampered progress during the 2011-12 seasons. However, with conditions now ideal, it is expected that the project will be completed within the June-September approved season for instream operations.

The work is proceeding in accordance with a detailed blueprint, with deep pools favoured by fish being created and gravel spawning beds and provisions for drops in water levels among the enhancements currently being put in place. In addition, the cooperative interagency approach allows for drainage and maintenance of riverbanks in an environmentally sensitive manner to be carried out.

The works are being funded under the Environmental River Enhancement Programme (EREP).

Tony Murphy, of Milltown Community Council, said what was being done was yet another example of what can be achieved when com-
