Tuam and Milltown win big at Tidy Towns awards

MILLTOWN and Tuam both scooped up prizes in this year's Tidy Towns ceremony at the RDS in Dublin on Friday.

Milltown received the National Gold Medal and Best in County prize in their category while Tuam took home the special Endeavour award.

The gold medal awarded to Milltown is the first prize of its kind to be given to an entrant from Co Galway. The Endeavour award is given to the town exhibiting the biggest improvement in its category over the past two years.

The Chairman of Milltown Tidy Towns, Eamon Callaghan, was delighted to finally be awarded the coveted gold medal after previously coming up short and said: "It was great to get it at long last. It is a great achievement to win but we

Helped along by the County Council, schoolchildren from Belmont and Milltown National Schools and members of the local employment scheme, the Tidy Towns Committee implemented a number of winning measures.
