
Milltown's new church one of the most beautiful in the country

THE new Church of St. Joseph, Milltown's £75,000 architectural centrepiece, was described on Wednesday evening as one of the most beautiful in the country.

Speaking at the dedication and official opening, the Archbishop of Tuam, Most Rev. Dr. Cunnane, said that it could justifiably take its place beside the most reautiful churches here, or in any country.

The design was quite unusual without being bizarre and even to the untrained eye its overtones of biblical symbolism suggested at once a dwelling pre-eminently functional and worthy of the

presence of God.

The new Church replaces a 150-year old parish church, which was also dedicated to St. Joseph, and the Archbishop congratulated the purish on its magnificent a hievement.

He said it was a great privilage for him to dedicate the new church and he prayed that God would reward those who had so generously contributed to the work.

"Challenging work"

He prod special tribute to the architects, John Thompson and Partners, and to the local building firm, Messra-Reimingham, who carried out the challenging work efficiently and in good time. The church, which is built

on the site of the former hadding, incorporates many of the features recommended by Vatican II and has an air of dignity, luminescence and strength.

The polished stone altar follows the design of the ground plan and is surmounted by a matching stone cross. The tabernacle was designed by the well known ecclesiastical artist. Enda Gill.

Ramp for the disabled

One of the most unusual features is the provision of a special ramp to facilitate disabled people and wheelchair users-St. Joseph's is believed to be the only church with such a facility.

High level windows give the building an unusual brightness without distracting attention from the altar on which complete attraction is focused by deliberately converging building lines.

Parishioners

In his address, Archbishop Cunnane paid special tribute to the parishioners who had contributed so generously to an undertaking which would have disheartened a less

thanked

generous people. He also thanked the priests who had borne a heavy share of the responsibility for the work and fund raising—often a thankless and discouraging

He went on: "It is indeed fitting that with the church building completed, your revered and saintly pastor, Fr. Concannon, should retire from his long years of ser-vice to the Diocese."

"I join with you in wishing him many years of happy retirement and thank God he will still be amongst you to serve you by his prayers as he has always done.'

Tribute to priests

Dr. Cunnane continued: "With an aging pastor it was inevitable that a great deal of the work and the worry fell on the shoulders of Fr. Berry and to a lesser but very real extent, Fr. Mo-Gowan.

"I cannot speak too highly of Fr. Berry's efforts, which of course are not yet done because a considerable debt still remains to be paidbut I congratulate him and Fr. McGowan on having seen their labours come to fruition today.

"With your new Parish Priest, Fr. Lowry-whom 1 wish many happy years among you-Fr. Berry can face the rest of his task with courage and with confidence that you will not fail to continue to give the same generous co-operation that you have given up to now.'

"Great tradition in parish"

The Archbishop added "Your parish has a great Catholic tradition, shown not least in the number of its priests gathered here today, not to






